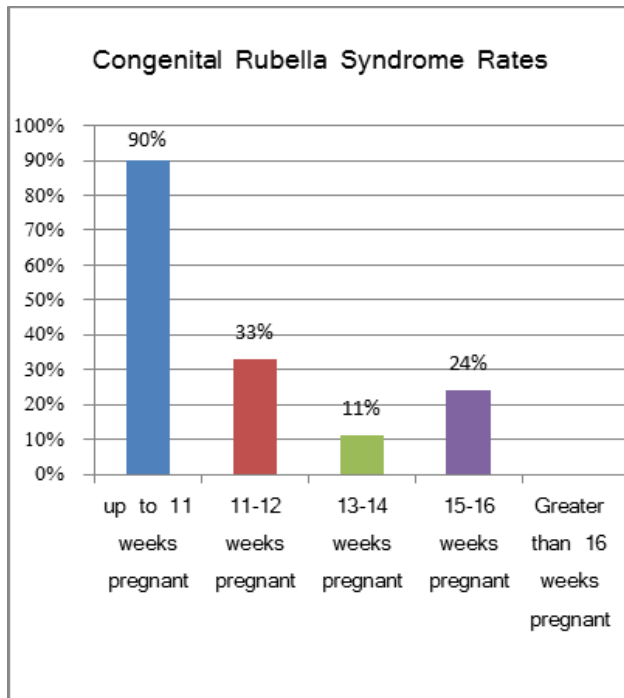


Figure 3. Congenital Rubella Syndrome Rates.
